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Introduction

Since 1981, the Peace & Justice Center (PJC) has been a Vermont leader in mobilizing action, tackling the interconnected issues of human rights and economic, social, and environmental justice.

Our political, social, and economic institutions were built on principles that favored some (male, white, typically abled, straight, cis-gendered, wealthy, powerful) at the expense of others (women and gender non-conforming people, people of color, differently abled, LGBTQI, the 99%, and the nonviolent). These dynamics are embedded in our culture's DNA. The PJC is committed to raising awareness of injustice, redressing the harms of generational oppression, and equipping people with tools to lead viable social change movements that include and empower all people and, ultimately, create a peaceful and just world.

There are three main aspects to our organization: Economic Justice, Education & Workshops, and Community Engagement. All three departments had incredibly successful years in their own right. The Peace & Justice Store continued to provide the Burlington community with fair trade, educational, local, and cultural materials. It was announced in October of 2022 that the store would be closing at the end of the year. But it will continue on in a reduced capacity in our new space.

The Education and Workshops Department held many private workshops with organizations and worked hard to provide three public programs. They onboarded seven new facilitators and continued working with their invaluable experienced ones.





New Allied Groups

The PJC was thrilled to welcome six new Allied Groups this year. Our Allied Group program offers fiscal sponsorship to grassroots activist groups, allowing them to receive tax-deductible donations and grant funding.

We also offer a number of other services to our groups, including access to our meeting space and volunteer database and marketing assistance.



Vermont Student Anti-Racism Network

Vermont Student Anti-Racism Network (VSARN) is comprised of students all over of Vermont. They are working to make a difference and promote racial equity and justice in schools across the state. VSARN most recently developed a program called The Book Project, "using grant funds to bring diverse, anti-racist books into classrooms across the state.



Vermont Stands with Ukraine

Stand with Ukraine VT encourages Vermonters to support Ukranians during the current war in Ukraine. The organization has a website that has a compilation of information about efforts supporting Ukraine. The Peace & Justice Center cohosted an event in June called Vermont Stands with Ukraine, which was a rally, march, and fundraiser that raised over \$5,500 for World Central Kitchen in Ukraine.

Unlikely Riders

Unlikely Riders is "a 'vermont' BIPOC collective mobilizing our community to find healing with the mountains while claiming space in the snow sports industry & culture." Their programs aims to reduce barriers to snowsports, and give BIPOC a space to safely explore identities and interests.



The Peoples Farm Stand

The People's Farmstand is a free pop up farmstand bringing the Burlington community local, organic produce. They are supported by volunteers who grow and harvest vegetables, work at the farmstand, and transport produce. The farmstand is brought to local neighborhoods, eliminating barriers to farmers markets.



Marigold House

Marigold House is an intergenerational community care space in Winooski that nourishes the practice of generosity and centers on cross-cultural growth, connection, and rest. The space "is designed to bring experiences of joy and wellbeing to People of the Global Majority". They offer after-school drop in spaces for LGBTQIA+ youth, workshops, ancestral cooking classes, bodywork, therapy, and support groups. Every general offering at Marigold House can be accessed for free.





Community Events and Special Projects



Author/ Artist Series

This Spring-fall has hosted a variety of presentations/ Q&A sessions with local Authors, Poets, artists, and activists. We hosted over a dozen conversations both virtually and in-person, striving to uplift marginalized voices. Our conversations included the topics of prison reform, Racism, sexism, ableism, homophobia, black joy, transphobia, indigenous rights, the broken school system, and so much more. Over 300 folx participated in these events from all across the state and country.



Social Justice Symposium

The Peace & Justice Center hosed its annual Social Justice Symposium. This week-long event (September 30th - October 7th) called on organizers and activists from across the state to come together and envision collective liberation across various social justice issues. The symposium will include

- Film Screening of The Price of Safety and Panelist conversation.
- A free and public workshop: Seeing and Disrupting Racism Workshop
- Our annual Ed Everts Award ceremony and celebration.



Transporation Justice Focus Groups

The Peace & Justice Center, Whole Heart, and the VT Professionals of Color Network Present worked with the city of South Burlington to host focus groups for the early stages of designing a pedestrian and bicycle pathway over I-89 at Exit 14. We worked with South Burlington to engage the public and stakeholders. Our team's goal was to increase accessibility and center voices of local communities.



Organizational Membership Project

This past summer, the PJC developed and started offering Organizational Memberships. These give organizations the opportunity to support the PJC while receiving benefits such as discounts on programming, consulting, and public workshops. We conducted a large outreach project promoting this new membership and connected with many excellent organizations. This membership supports our important work while also connecting us with more like-minded organizations and valued community members.
