Since 1979, the Peace & Justice Center (PJC) has been a Vermont leader in mobilizing action, tackling the interconnected issues of human rights and economic, social, and environmental justice.

This has been a hard year for many of us. The non-profit sector has been attacked like never before by this federal administration, forcing us to do more with less resources. Authoritarianism, fascism, and bigotry are ascendant in many places across the world, and those of us who believe in peace, justice, and grassroots democracy are forced to fight harder and smarter. However, the Peace & Justice Center did not hold back, and we were able to expand on a lot of the great programs we started over the past two years, and we also were able to engage hundreds of new people in the struggle.


This year, we built on the incredible foundation we laid last year on our four focus areas: Peace-Building Education, Public Assembly, Collective Ritual, and Community Support.

We have engaged more than 100+ volunteers, clocking in more than 400+ volunteer hours. We dedicated ourselves and our community to rebuilding grassroots democracy and ensuring all our rights are protected and expanded. We are so proud of all the work we have accomplished! We have original songs to share, letters to write, futures to build, and a better Vermont to live in thanks to all our work and the work of our tireless volunteers. We can't wait to continue this work with all of you over the course of the next year, and anticipate the struggles to come in solidarity with our neighbors.




Budget Overview


Demonstrations and actions fighting for greater civil rights, an expansion of peace and human rights, and freedom for all people

Empowering Grassroots Democracy

The Peace & Justice Center acted as an incubator for grassroots democratic action all throughout the last year! We hosted poster-making events for demonstrations, including the giant No Kings marches and Hands Off protests, as well as various smaller demonstrations throughout the year. Our Library of Things, which includes free use of our tables, megaphones, speaker and microphone sets, rolling carts, and more, was utilized by more than a dozen grassroots events, empowering them to activate folks at a gathering for little or no cost. Organizations like FreeHer VT, MAD Advocates, People's Pride, and more, all utilized our equipment checked out from our Library of Things. Our printer and community space was also utilized by various organizations, including Vermonters for Justice in Palestine, to help spread the word about their organization efforts. The space served as a gathering place for meetings and a location to view a court hearing for the family, friends, and allies of a community member who was detained by Immigration, Customs, and Enforcement (ICE). We were able to offer court support both in and outside court rooms and research support for organizing around ICE activity in Vermont.



We are proud to exist as a gathering space for expression, creativity, and upholding the inalienable right to the freedom of speech. We will continue to act as an incubator and promoter of autonomy and grassroots democracy.



The Peace & Justice Center was proud to continue the work we started last year and expand our collective ritual campaigns. This year, we were able to write far more letters, hold far more folk song events in more locations, and make more zines, posters, and buttons than ever before. We believe that the work of building a peaceful and just world can be enlivening and fun, and we strive to empower people to feel like small acts can make a big difference. One prominent feature we added this year was writing our own folk songs in community together! You can find a copy of all the original folk songs we wrote at the back of this report in the appendix.

Collective Ritual included cultivating space for collective grief, as well. Along with art and song, medicinal herbs were incorporated into events, inviting us to tend to our inner systems and our connection to the Earth.



Mourn, and Organize

Flipping labor activist and songwriter Joe Hill's quote to something akin to that of fellow labor activist Mother Jones', PJC programming this year created space to do just that. In a society that often secludes grief and yet creates so much for us, on a collective level, to grieve, we invite space for grief ritual, particularly that which also offers ways to connect that energy to action for just change. In practice, one way this looked for the PJC this year was observing the first anniversary of Ayşenur Ezgi Eygi's martyring in Palestine and expanding the scope to include other Americans killed in the West Bank in recent years, the history of the village Beita where she was killed, and Palestinian martyrs of Beita and elsewhere in the West Bank.





For Samhain, Gaelic predecessor to Halloween, the PJC made an alternative to Halloween decorations: memorial art installations to the tens of thousands of Palestinians killed in Gaza.



The displays featured press vests & medical jackets with names of journalists and healthcare workers martyred, along with an informational sign, which were put up in multiple houses around Burlington.

Print Fundraiser for Palestinian Farmers in Gaza

Teaming with family and friends of martyred farmer Yousef Abu Rabee, the PJC enlisted eight artists to create prints in honor of Yousef and the farmers of northern Gaza. We collaborated with Hard Pressed Print Shop of West Danville, who hosted multiple print nights for the artists. The prints debuted at the third annual Queer Arts Festival in Barre, VT and, so far, have raised more than \$1,000 for farmers of Beit Lahia, in the Gaza Strip. These farmers continue to grow and distribute vegetables and other food, rebuild community infrastructure, and are again attempting to access their farms, with a determination inspired by their dear beloved Yousef Abu Rabee.

Peace-Building Education



Studying and Teaching Peace

At the core of the Peace & Justice Center, and something that we have held as our central means for achieving our mission of a peace and just world, is peace-building education. As Murray Bookchin said, "Every revolutionary project is, above all, an educational one." We were proud to offer many free lectures and participatory educational opportunities to the community this year!

The PJC had the honor to host multiple authors, including Sarah Towle ("Crossing the Line: Finding America in the Border Lines") and Shadi Salem ("Beneath the Gaza Sky").

Another, major way that we taught peace this year was our Rad History series, which is an ongoing series of free lectures about activist movements of the past and the ways that they can inform our work today. Movements we covered included the Situationist International, the Haitian Revolution, early cycling advocacy, and more!

We also hosted an ongoing series of game nights where participants played the game Solarpunk Futures. In this game, players are asked to envision a utopian future and how we can get there from our current reality. We adapted this game to be about a utopian Burlington specifically, and even took the players on a Burlington Future walk.





Abolish the Empire

We collaborated with FreeHer VT on the Abolish the Empire event in the spring of 2025. The day was inspired by large turnouts at protests full of people craving ways to deepen their resistance to an increasingly authoritarian regime. The PJC was involved in organizing logistics and, at the event, led prison letter-writing and co-facilitated a power mapping exercise on how empire shows up in Vermont. Other activities included screen printing, relationship-building physical games, talks on organizing strategies and projects, and a workshop with Bread & Puppet Theater. It was a beautiful blend of assembly, education, and ritual!

“And Water Brings Tomorrow” Film Screening

Filmmaker Ashley Smith joined us in another joint FreeHer VT-PJC event, a screening of his new film on prisons and abolition, “And Water Brings Tomorrow.” The documentary focuses on prisons that have been shut down, what they’ve been turned into, the organizations behind their closure, and the role of climate change in shaping these. Ticket sales have gone to the canteen funds of people incarcerated at South Burlington’s Chittenden Regional Correctional Facility (Vermont’s women’s prison).
